Course Description:	This course will review the neural bases of behaviour, with an emphasis on human cognitive function and dysfunction. Initial lectures will consist of a general introduction to neuroanatomy, cortical organization, and methods used by cognitive neuroscientists. These will be followed by lectures focusing on specific areas of cognitive functioning and related disorders (e.g., attention & neglect; memory & amnesia; language & aphasia, etc.). Case reports will be used to illustrate key points. Students will explore findings from cognitive, neuropsychology, and neuroimaging studies to understand the relationships between brain, behaviour, and cognitive function. <i>Prerequisites: AK/AS/HH/SC/PSYC 1010 6.00 or AK/HH/PSYC 2410 6.00, with a minimum grade of C; AK/AS/HH/SC/PSYC 2240 3.00 or AK/HH/PSYC 3145 3.00. Course credit exclusion: None.</i>
