Course Description

This course introduces the student to theory, concepts and methods in the field of motivational psychology. A variety of topics will be covered including the biological basis of motivation, learning theory, cognitive approach and emotional aspects of motivation.

Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate broad knowledge of cognitive determinants of motivation.
- 2. Describe and evaluate current theory and research in motivation.
- 3. Understand and interpret principles of motivation in everyday life.
- 4. Define causes of human motivation from different perspectives.

Specific Learning Objective

The specific learning objective for this course is to provide students with psychological tools to obtain life goals.

Course Requirements and Assessment

- 5. <u>Non-medical circumstances must be supported by appropriate documentation</u> (i.e. death certificate to prove the date and your relationship to the deceased).
