**Course Description**

The course offers an overview of psychopathology and an opportunity to explore the scientist-practitioner approach to psychopathology. Course content includes clinical descriptions, approaches/paradigms, etiologies, treatment procedures, and treatment outcomes of psychological disorders. The course involves formal lectures, clinical studies, and small group discussions and may be supplemented by films/videos and invited guests.

**Learning Outcomes**

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

1. Demonstrate knowledge of abnormal psychology.
2. Articulate trends in abnormal psychology.
3. Express knowledge of abnormal psychology in written form
4. Describe and explain limits to generalizability of research findings in abnormal psychology.

## Specific Learning Outcomes

The purpose of this course is to introduce students to the field of psychopathology and to a scientist-practitioner approach to the study of abnormal psychology.

1. Learn about clinical descriptions, approaches, and treatment procedures used in the field of clinical psychology.
2. Explore the scientist-practitioner approach to psychopathology.
3. Think critically about approaches to abnormal psychology.
4. Consider the issues of gender and culture in relation to the study of psychopathology.
