Course Description

In this course we will be learning about the continuum of personality from normal to disordered behavior. The development and clinical features of personality disorders are discussed with reference to the prevailing theoretical perspectives (biological, psychodynamic, interpersonal, cognitive, and evolutionary). Students will also be able to learn more about a specific aspect of problematic personality characteristics through preparation of a psychobiography (i.e., paper examining the personality and life) of a famous person of their choosing.

Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate in-depth knowledge in personality theory and behaviour disorders.
- 2. Critically evaluate, synthesize and resolve conflicting results in personality theory and behaviour disorders.
- 3. Articulate trends in personality theory and behaviour disorders.
- 4. Locate research articles and show critical thinking about research findings in personality theory and behaviour disorders.
- 5. Express psychological knowledge in written form in more than 1 sub-discipline.
- 6. Engage in evidence-based dialogue with course director and peers.
- 7. Demonstrate an ability to work with others.

Specific Learning Objectives

- By the end of the course you will: have a critical understanding of the dimensional conceptualization and assessment of personality
- develop an understanding of the necessary, sufficient, and contributory causes in the development of disordered personality
- develop a deeper understanding of the contribution of personality to a variety of disordered behaviours
- develop the ability to write and present materials related to disordered behaviours

Description of Assignments

<u>Participation:</u> **10%**. Attendance in class and participation in class discussions will comprise 10% of your final grade.

<u>Exams</u>: **40%**. There will be two exams, a midterm and a final, each worth 20% of your final grade. These two exams will cover the readings and lecture materials reviewed in the time frame indicated. Multiple choice and short essay questions will be included.

<u>Presentations:</u> **15%** In the first term, students will prepare and present a brief (5 minute) presentation regarding the famous person they have chosen for their psychobiography; the topic and ideas are to be conveyed in order to receive feedback and suggestions from class members. This component comprises 5% of the final grade. In the second term, students will prepare a 15-20 minute presentation covering the highlights of their analysis of the character and life of the person they have chosen to be the subject of their psychobiography. This component comprises 10% of the final course grade.

<u>Paper topic summary:</u> **10%.** Students will submit a 2-3 page summary of how they plan to approach and structure their psychobiography paper. This component comprises 10% of your final grade.

<u>Paper:</u> **25%.** Students will submit an approximately 15-page (written pages, before the references) psychobiography on a famous person (approved by instructor). More information regarding the form and content of the paper will be discussed in class. The paper comprises 25% of your final grade.

Grading as per Senate Policy

The grading scheme for the course conforms to the 9-point grading system used in undergraduate programs at York (e.g., A + = 9, A = 8, B + - 7, C + = 5, etc.). Assignments and tests* will bear either a letter grade designation or a corresponding number grade (e.g. A + = 90 to 100, A = 80 to 90, B + = 75 to 79, etc.)

Late Work/Missed Tests or Exams

Students with a documented reason for missing a course test, such as illness, compassionate grounds, etc., which is confirmed by supporting documentation (Attending Physician Statement which can be found at: http://registrar.yorku.ca/pdf/attending-physicians-statement.pdf) may request accommodation from the Course Instructor. Further extensions or accommodation will require students to submit a formal petition to the Faculty.

Assignment Submission: Assignments for this course are to be printed and submitted to the course instructor during class time on the day they are due, AND via Moodle electronic submission. Lateness Penalties: Proper academic performance depends on students doing their work not only well, but on time. Accordingly, assignments for this course must be received on the due date specified for the assignment. Assignments received later than the due date will be penalized 1 point per day from total earned on the assignment. Exceptions to the lateness penalty for valid reasons such as illness, compassionate grounds, etc., may be entertained by the Course Instructor but will require supporting documentation (e.g., a doctor's letter).

Missed Exams: If an exam is to be missed:

- 1) The student must contact me by phone or email or the course secretary by telephone (Zehra Bandhu ext. 66232) within 48 hours of the examination. You must clearly state the following:
 - your name (it helps to spell your last name)
 - vour student number,
 - course and section
 - phone number at which you can be reached
 - best time to call you back
- 2) If you cannot contact me or the secretary during this 48 hour period, subsequent documentation accounting for the delay must be provided.
- 3) Appropriate documentation verifying the circumstances for the missed examination must be provided at the time specified by the instructor. Failure to provide appropriate documentation will result in a grade of F on the missed examination.

What is appropriate documentation?

a) Medical circumstances – tests/exams missed due to medical circumstances must be supported by an attending physician's statement or a statement by a psychologist or counselor. The physician's statement must include the following: i) full name, mailing address, and telephone number of the physician. ii) state the nature of the illness and its duration (i.e., specific dates covered), and iii) an indication of whether the illness and/or medication prescribed would have SERIOUSLY affected the student's ability to write the exam.

You MUST use the recommended physician's form found at http://www.registrar.yorku.ca/pdf/attend physician statement

NOTE: the physician's office may be contacted to verify that the forms were completed by the physician.

- b) Non-medical circumstances tests/exams missed due to non-medical circumstances must be supported by appropriate documentation, i.e., death certificates, obituary notice, automobile accident reports, airline/bus ticket/receipt for emergency travel (with date of booking on ticket), etc. Airline/train/bus ticket/receipts for emergency travel must indicate destination, departure, and return dates. *Having to work at the time of a test is not considered a valid excuse for missing the test*.
- 4) The manner in which the missed examination (which has been legitimately documented) is handled will be at the discretion of the course director. E.g., In the case of a make-up exam, you must be prepared to write the test at the make-up date. Although the content to be examined will be the same, the format may or may not follow that of the original test/exam. YOU must check with me for the date and time of the make-up. A conflict in another course during the time of the make-up is not an acceptable reason for missing the make-up (unless there is an examination in the other course at that time). You should be aware that if you miss the exam before the official drop date, you may not have the requisite feedback on your course work to determine if you need to drop the course or not. As a result, it is in your best interest to write the exam at the time it is scheduled.
