General Description:

Research and theory with animals are considered. Perspectives in evolution, ethology, sociobiology and psychology are covered. Topics include animal communication, habit selection, feeding behaviour and reproduction.

Learning Objectives:

1. To demonstrate in-depth knowledge of animal behaviour.

- 3. To express psychological knowledge of animal behaviour in written form.
- 4. To describe and explain limits to generalizability of research findings on animal behaviour.
- 5. To demonstrate ability to relate information on the psychology of animal behaviour to real life situations.

Prerequisites:

HH/PSYC 1010 6.00 (Introduction to Psychology), with a minimum grade of C. Completed at least 54 earned credits. Course credit exclusions: GL/PSYC/NATS 3680 3.00.

Evaluation:

As indicated on the schedule, there will be two equally weighted exams and an optional assignment worth 14% of the final grade. 14% of the final grade will be based on Moodle forum participation. Grading: The grading scheme for the course conforms to the 9-point grading system used in undergraduate programs at York (e.g., A+=9, A=8, B+-7, C+=5, etc.).

Attendance:

To encourage (and reward) perfect attendance, I will take roll every class. It is students' responsibility to ensure that their name is signed on the class attendance sheet. Students with *perfect* class attendance (i.e., NO absences for any reason whatsoever) will receive 3% on top of their final grade. Please note that 2 instances of being late (or absent when the list is distributed) are equivalent to one absence. The student is responsible to know the material presented in class.
