## **Course Description**

The primary goal of this course is to provide students with an introduction to research and theorizing in social psychology. Topics covered in this course will include research methods, the social self, social cognition and attribution, emotion, attitudes and social information processing, persuasion, social influence, groups, stereotyping and prejudice, and altruism.

#### **Description of Assignment**

Assignment will be delivered via Inquizitive each week. It consists of the questions that will be taught in that week and it takes an average of 40 minutes to finish.

There will be no makeup exams for Exam 1 and Exam 2. If the student misses one exam, provides the proper documentation and contacts the undergraduate office within 48 hours, the grade on the final cumulative exam will be reweighted to include the missed component. If the student misses both Exam 1 and Exam 2, the student will be required to meet with the course director, Dr. Xia Fang, and with the Undergraduate Program Director when requested by the course director. The student may be advised to withdraw from the course. If the student misses the final cumulative exam, provides the proper documentation and contacts the undergraduate office within 48 hours, the student may petition for Deferred Standing. Only one makeup final exam will be offered at a date determined by the Course Director.
