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Course description

This course examines contemporary research and important theoretical works regarding biological, cognitive, emotional, and social development from birth through adolescence. The primary goal of the course is to gain familiarity with the theory, research, and current debates within the study of developmental psychology. A secondary goal is to encourage reflection to help students think critically about the information that they come across in academic, professional, and personal situations. Major themes throughout the course include: interaction between genetic and environmental influences on development, stage versus continual development, and factors that lead to optimal development.

Learning objectives

- To build an understanding of the fundamental concepts of developmental psychology that will help with future courses in psychology and across disciplines
- To support an appreciation of the interplay between theory, research, and practice
- To develop an understanding of the assumptions, limitations, and controversies within the field of developmental psychology
- To build foundational skills in research methodology, including: the development of research questions, ethical practice, and critical review of research
- To engage in effective communication about central topics within the course toward a range of target audiences
- To encourage future community members, educators, parents, and policy-makers to think critically about the information they encounter to be able to maximize the development and success of all children

Tests

All tests and the exam are *non-cumulative* and include multiple-choice and short-answer questions. All material from the textbook, lectures, guest lectures, videos, and demonstrations will be covered. Students will be required to show their student ID during each test. The test schedule is based on York University's Senate Policy on Religious Observance. It is the responsibility of the student to anticipate possible conflicts and contact the TA within *two-weeks* of the test date. Students are expected to be *available* throughout the exam period (April 4-20).

Moodle Questions

Moodle discussion questions provide students with the opportunity to expand on the topics covered in class. At the end of class each week, a question will be posted on the Moodle site. Students will respond to these questions online and the response will be due at the start of class the following week. A total of 9 questions will be posted, and students are expected to complete 7 of them and submit all of these online. Four of the responses will be graded on a pass/fail basis with 0.5% awarded for each completed response for a total of 2%. Students will be expected to submit an additional printed copy of 3 of their responses for grading. A response to one of questions 1-3 will be submitted at the start of class on February 8th, one of questions 4-6 on February 28th, and one of questions 7-9 on March 28th. Each of these will be worth 6% for a total of 18%. Responses should be about 3/4 to 1 page in length (single-spaced) and should take most students an hour or less to complete. Grammar and spelling errors will not be penalized, unless they substantially impact the clarity of the response. Point form can be used when appropriate. Referencing additional sources is not required, but when sources beyond the textbook and lecture notes are used, they must be referenced in APA 6 format (e.g. Jones & Wong, 2005).
